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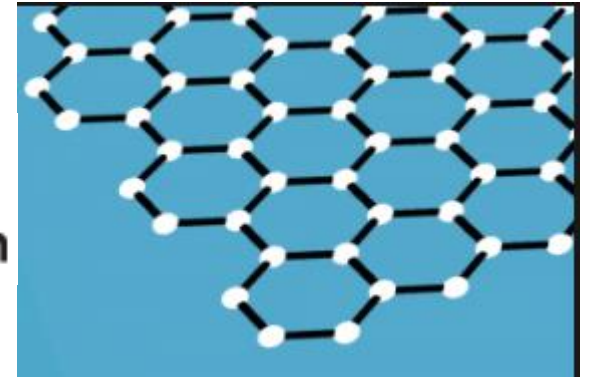

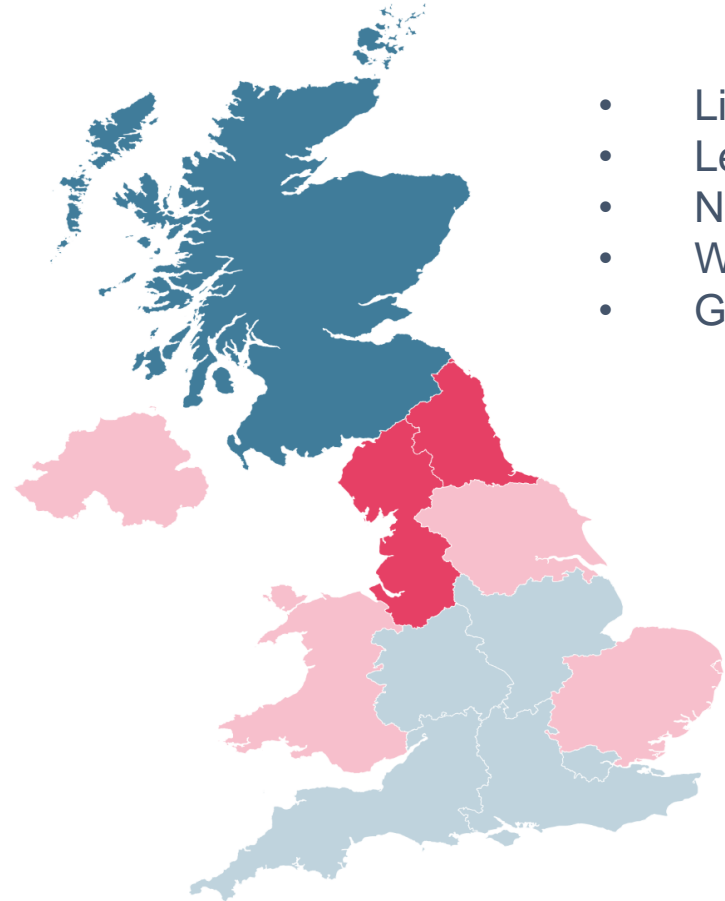
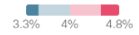

Topic 1. Understanding the clinically extremely vulnerable (shielded*) population.

*Patients on the Welsh Government Shielded Patient List, up to and including the 31st July 2020.

There are substantial regional differences in the share of extremely vulnerable residents

Percentage of residents who are clinically extremely vulnerable by region



- Liverpool & Wirral 7.5%
- Leeds 5.2%
- NW London 5.1%
- Wales 4.2%
- Grampian 2.5%

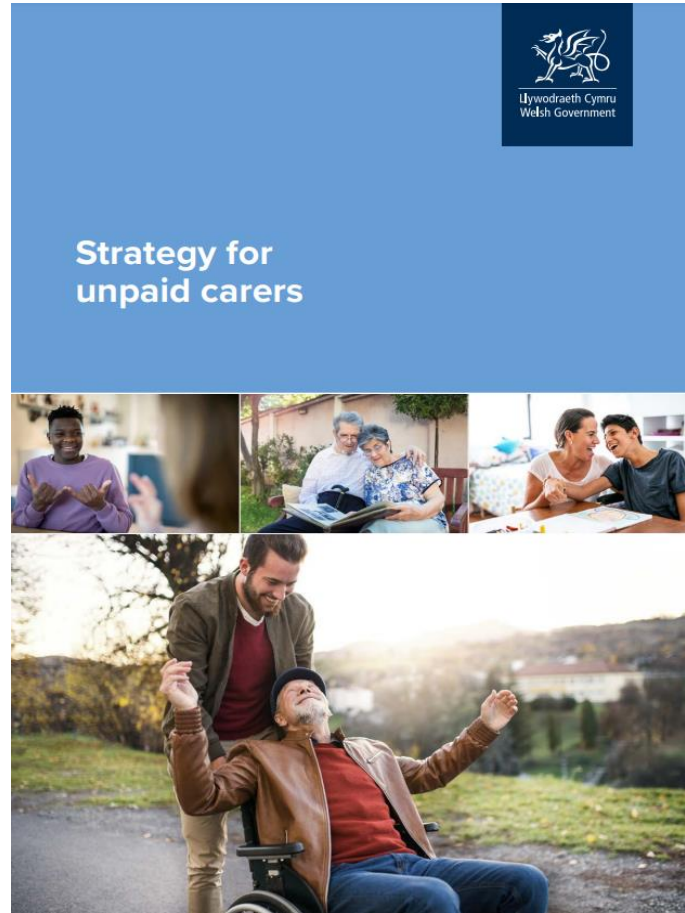

Data development project: Enable the use of carer assessment data

Local Authority (LA) Carer Assessment Data

Aim

To use carer assessment data in Wales to better understand the health and wellbeing of carers and inform action to support their needs.



Priority 1 theme: Working with local authorities to improve carers assessments

We will:

- Use the data we collect to develop a range of solutions that enable local authorities to deliver timely, effective statutory assessments that are responsive to individual needs of unpaid carers.

How we will achieve this

Sector/organisation Timeframe

Use the findings from the SCIE research commissioned by Welsh Government, **Public Health Wales' Data Development Project**, and data from the Performance and Improvement Framework to determine what specific actions are needed to improve the take up carers needs assessments.
